Annie's Corner



DATE/ NUT LOAF



1 tablespoon butter
½ a cup of sugar
1 egg
Pinch salt
1 cup chopped dates
½ a cup walnuts
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup plain flour
½ a cup self raising flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon mixed spice

Cream butter and sugar, then add salt and egg.

Sprinkle soda over dates, and pour 1 cup of boiling water over them.

Add nuts, dates and water to butter, sugar and egg mixture.

Lastly add flour and spices.

Bake in log tin in a slow oven for 1 hour (160 deg)

As an alternative to this I found that instead of 1 cup of chopped dates, you add 3 oz dates and 1 ½ oz sultanas, it seems to make the recipe more moist, and it also freezes really well....

Trip Clarification

Clarification was sought regarding the level of Approval required before a trip could be considered a "Club" trip. The following clarifications were settled upon:

- Trips do not need to be approved by the trip coordinator but he must be notified in order for the trip to be considered a "Club" trip.
- Trips may be submitted either via Trip Data Form, Yahoo Group or informally however see above to be considered a "Club Trip"
- Trips should be reviewed where necessary at committee level to ensure that the trip was within capabilities of the trip leader.
- If absolutely necessary approval for a trip may be withdrawn if the committee feel that the trip may in anyway expose the participants to an unacceptable level of risk e.g. trip being lead into a high/extreme fire risk area.

Kimberley Trip Departure Date – April 29

As the departure date came closer my concern was the weather. As the late arrival of Cyclone Monica flooded Northern Australia it started the first change of plans for the trip. The original plan was north to Katherine, left along the Victoria Highway to Kununurra, the Gibb River Road, Mitchell Plateau, Mitchell Falls then Derby, Broome, Bungles, Tanami Road, Kings Canyon, Olgas, Ayers Rock then home. It was decided to head across to Ayers Rock, the Olgas and Kings Canyon then the Meereenie Loop Road to Alice Springs to give the north time to dry out.

29th April finally arrived and Brian and I headed to Adelaide to meet up with Graeme and Sue after which we all started heading north staying at Woomera, Coober Pedy, and a quick look at the Breakaways then onto Erldunda where we turned left to Ayers Rock. Brian did the walk up the rock while the rest of us did the base walk.



It was then onto the Olgas for another walk and then Kings Canyon for the rim walk of 11 km which was the best walk of the three.



It was then onto the badly corrugated Meereenie Loop Road to visit Glen Helen Gorge and Ormiston Gorge and

later Serpentine Gorge before Alice Springs. It was then north again stopping at Mataranka for a swim then into Katherine which had been flooded a couple of weeks earlier.

Turning left along the Victoria Highway where we later met up with Derek and Janet before stopping at Keep River National Park.



After a walk through part of the park it was then onto Western Australia through the quarantine check point and into Hidden Valley Caravan Park at Kununurra for a couple of days. From there we did day trips to Lake Argyle and surrounds and then Wyndham with its magnificent views from the 5 Rivers Lookout.

The Gibb River Road was still closed so we headed to El Questro where we walked the various gorges, Zebedee Hot Springs, Emma Gorge and El Questro Gorge which were great. We also had a look at the two lookouts that required 4wd: Saddleback Ridge and Brancos Lookout which gave a good view over most of El Questro. The reports we received were the Gibb River Road was open but access to the Mitchell Plateau was still closed so back to the Northern Highway and onto the Bungles for more walking to the various gorges and chasms.



All were very spectacular and worth the effort to have a look. We contacted Drysdale Station for an update on access to the Mitchell Plateau and news was not good, the King Edward River was running at 900mm and flowing fast. Derek and Janet then decided that they would go back east and then head home so we parted with our group heading west having a look at Halls Creek, Fitzroy Crossing, Geike Gorge and into Broome. We had three days at Broome looking around and getting a new pinion seal fitted to the Musso, some good sunset photo's at Cable Beach while Brian had a camel ride. We then went onto Derby where we did a flight over the bay of 1000 islands to the Horizontal Waterfall and a look at the sunsets from Derby jetty.

We then finally hit the Gibb River Road to Windjana Gorge which was a great walk then a walk through Tunnel Creek which was even better. It was then onto Silent Grove and a walk into Bell Gorge. We then found our way to Mornington Wilderness Camp after a slow 95 km track in. We drove to Dimond Gorge on the Fitzroy River and a look at Cadjeput Waterhole. Next day we went to Sir John Gorge and Blue Bush Waterhole.

Back onto the Gibb River Road stopping at Galvin Gorge and Manning Gorge and Barnett River Gorge then finally Drysdale Station to refuel and camp at Miners Pool on the Drysdale river. Finally we were heading into the Mitchell Plateau, the 1st obstacle being the King Edward River which by this time was about 700mm and flowing but not too bad. We all survived the crossing and a couple of mud holes before arriving at the camp ground which was free with nice clean toilets.

Next day we did the 3.5km walk into Mitchell Falls via Little Mertens Falls, Mertens Falls then wade across the river and wander across the plateau until finally the very spectacular Mitchell Falls.

Due to the late wet season there was a lot of water going over the 5 tiered falls and they were stunning, well worth the effort involved to get there. It was hard to tear ourselves away but it was back to camp. Next day it was back to Drysdale stopping at two locations to look at aboriginal rock paintings.

It was back to the Gibb River Road and we started heading towards Kununurra. Graeme and Sue decided to stop at Home Valley Station while Brian and I continued through the stunning Pentacost Range crossing the Durrack River and

then the Pentacost River. At Kununurra it was time to give the vehicles a good wash and clean out, wash our clothes and ourselves. We also did a walk through the Hidden Valley National Park behind the caravan park.

When we all met up again we headed off back down the Northern Highway to Halls Creek, refuelled then onto the Tanami Road to the Wolfe Creek Meteorite Crater. After a cool night we walked down into the crater for a look. Back on the Tanami Road we did a brief fuel stop at Billuna which is also the end of the Canning Stock Route. That night we camped along the track and 6 dingoes raided our camp getting into anything that was left outside. They finally stole Brian's walking boots, we got one back but the other one could not be found. It was then onto Tilmouth Well and Alice Springs.

After leaving Alice Springs we stopped at the Finke River for a cuppa. When I restarted the car the alternator bearing collapsed which also stopped the alternator from working. Being the weekend I decided to keep going south to Port Augusta where I hoped to get a replacement. Graeme and Sue were going to go down the Oodnadatta Track while Brian followed me in case the alternator seized. At Port Augusta a new alternator was fitted. While waiting for it some other campers told us it was -7 over in the Flinders Ranges which is where we intended to go. This did not impress us so we tossed a coin to decide whether to go inland or down to the coast and home. Luck was with us as the coin decided we would head for the coast so we headed off to Adelaide, down through the Coorong to Mount Gambier, Portland and home.

It was a fabulous trip of about 13100km and 8 weeks. Some of the roads were very rough with corrugations, some caravan parks were pretty ordinary, the worst one being at Elliott, DO NOT stay there it is an insect ridden dump!

With the late wet season forcing us to change our plans several times it actually worked in our favour and the route we finally took was the way we should have planned initially. It was an incredible experience meeting a lot of fellow travellers and swapping stories, getting advice from them as to where they had been and what to look out for. Many thanks to all involved for making the trip a huge success.

Tea/Coffee and The Kimberley

April 27th to June 24th 2006

Destination/Objective

Kimberley and surrounds here we come. With some reservations however, as the weather conditions have invoked a schedule that must be flexible. Reports on road and camping conditions are conflicting.

But why are we travelling over 13,000km and spending \$'000's to see what is considered the last frontier: 'The Kimberley'. Is it the reputation of the Gibb River Road and the Tanami Track that has challenged our sense of adventure?

Is it the opportunity to capture the magnificent scenery of Tunnel Creek, Windjana Gorge, Galvans Gorge or the famous Mitchell River Falls on film? Maybe the sense of adventure in travelling and bush camping in remote areas has rekindled our exploration instincts? Or, is it just the need to escape the rat race, to slow down and take time?

For what ever reason, each participant will have their own driving force to undertake this journey.

Itinerary

The initial itinerary for this adventure was to travel north along the Stuart Highway to Katherine, west to Kununurra, then along the Gibb River Road to Derby, visiting various scenic spots along the way. Derby to Broome, then back

along the Black Top to Halls Creek and thereafter the Tanami Track to Alice Springs for an exploration of The Centre; finally entering Victoria via Mildura.

But an itinerary must be very flexible when travelling the outback, particularly in the north, as it is amazing what a Category 5 cyclone can do to one's travel plans. In our case many of the features we planned to visit were closed due to water being up to 2 meters deep over the roads.

The first of many variations to the itinerary involved delaying our arrival in the north to allow time for the roads and camping areas to dry out. This was achieved by visiting Ayres Rock, The Olgas, Kings Canyon and Alice Springs first. This still did not allow enough time for the flood waters to recede, so Plan C took us part way along the Gibb River Road to El Questro then back to the Bungle Bungles, Broome and Derby via the all weather road.



Finally the flood waters did drop sufficiently to tackle Gibb River Road, Mitchell Plateau and Tanami Track.

By far the most difficult decision involved Janet and Derek. Derek maintained a very strong desire to see the Mitchell Falls in all their splendour, both from the ground and via helicopter. Several days were spent working out the best solution for us all. Sadly Janet and Derek did not have sufficient time to wait for the rivers to drop so headed in the opposite direction. Ultimately, this proved to be the only solution.

Travelling the Gibb River Road we visited Windjana Gorge, Tunnel Creek, Lennard River Gorge, Bell Gorge, Mornington Wilderness Park, Manning Gorge, Barnett River Gorge, Mitchell Falls, just some of the many famous names one hears about.

After a short recovery period at Kununurra, Plan ????? saw us heading for the Tanami Track via Halls Creek. From here it was on to Alice Springs then Melbourne via Adelaide. A trip of approximately 8 week's duration.

Settling In

Having left Melbourne behind, the rush to get there was on. But to where? Once clear of the rain and the cold weather we began to realize that time was ours, time to slow down and time to stop for a 'cuppa'.

Having realised that we could take our time the pattern for daily life soon developed.

Early rise with the sun, hit the road after a leisurely breakfast, travel a short distance, stop at a scenic stop for a 'cuppa', travel some more then stop for the midday snack, more travel then pull over early afternoon to set up camp. Yes, you guessed it, in time to have another 'cuppa' of sorts whilst reviewing the scenic delights of the day.

Camaraderie

A feature of trips such as this is the time taken to sit, relax and talk about the day's activities and those yet to come. To sit around the camp fire to talk about Brian's upcoming attempt to climb "The Rock", to tease him about updating Wills, protective clothing, his fitness and that WE will look after his Landcruiser should anything happen. This coupled with a sleepless night made Brian's achievement in conquering "That Rock" all the more memorable. Brian's expression on completing the task was one that cannot be described, however the smile was broad and the excitement level high.

There were many memorable occasions, but one that comes to mind is Derek attempting to prepare carrots for the evening meal. First step was removal of the skin, then very slowly an attempt to accurately dissect precise segments. This proved too much for Brian as he appeared with a tape measure to aid Derek's quest for perfection.

The size of a Boab tree can be determined in many ways, it can also be measured by the number of people it takes to give the tree a hug. The Boab under which we camped at Kununurra was measured as a 'four person hug tree'.

Activities

Walks around The Rock, through the Olgas and over Kings Canyon have done wonders to our fitness, as did visiting the many gorges. An eleven km walk around the base of Ayers Rock became the bench mark, hence a mere six km return walk into the Mitchell Falls was looked forward to as a 'walk in the park'!

A tour through the West McDonald Ranges with visits to Glen Helen Gorge, Ormiston Gorge, Serpentine Gorge and the Ochre Pits completed Stage 1 of a trip that exposed us to the many colours and landscapes of the Red Centre. The Green Centre? Many call it the Red Centre but with recent rains we found the sweeping view was green, with flushes of colour from those opportunistic wild flowers.

Along the Mereenie Loop between Kings Canyon and Alice Springs (our first taste of gravel roads) we counted 95 shredded tyres left abandoned along the side of the road.

A swim someone said, so it was off to the warm springs at Mataranka. As the main pool was closed we had to contend with the minor pool. The closure was due to repairs caused by the recent floods having washed away some of the infrastructure. Indications were that the flood water reached an estimated 20 metres above the normal level of the spring.

Bird life was abundant but not so animals. One of the few sightings occurred when Sue was greeted by a Green Tree (?) Snake whilst clambering over rocks on the way to Emma Gorge.



Brian, whilst in Broome, decided that a sunset camel ride along Cable Beach needed to be experienced.

No other members of the expedition was game to take this on, but were very enthusiastic for all details of the adventure.



Brian returned, quite elated at the experience and even a little stoked at his new nickname of "Lawrence"!

The lure of a flight over the Horizontal Waterfall, out from Derby, proved to be too much for George (Biggles), so a quick investigation into flights, a pilot found and he was off! . This time several other members of the expedition took their courage in hand and joined him. Seeing the Kimberly coast line, the mud flats at low tide, The Thousand Islands, the pearl farming areas and the Horizontal Waterfall from the air was just awesome.



The WOW Factor

But how do you compare one magnificent gorge, spring or waterfall against another? How do you decide which area or park is the best?

Enter the 'ooh-ah factor'. A score obtained by simply measuring the enthusiasm attached to the ooh-ah by individuals when a particular site is mentioned.

So far equal billing goes something like:

The Chamberlain River crossing to Branco's lookout - Brian
The Painted Desert and Tunnel Creek - Sue
Lennard River Gorge - Graeme
Mitchell River Falls - George

Menus

Kings Canyon saw our first camp roast, of Beef on a bed of caramelised onion, accompanied by roast potatoes, roast pumpkin, greens and gravy all enjoyed by the light of a silvery moon and a million stars, delicious!

The success of this feast was soon followed up with a camp roast of Lamb and all the trimmings, together with a 'joint venture' dessert: Rosella (bush tucker) and Apricot Crumble with warm Custard.

This feast was a source of interest to our camp neighbour's who had no idea that this sort of food could be accomplished, in the bush, by ordinary travellers!

Our greatest roasting achievement was Pork complete with a crisp crackle.

We enjoyed a 5 star 'Barra' meal at Katherine RSL, an Asian Banquet in Broome and the occasional take away. Eating out only becomes an option if one is in 'Town' or finds the rare eating establishment associated with one of the Station properties. There is another option, ie fellow campers. George and Brian were treated (by strangers) to a casserole meal on their very first night of travel in Adelaide.

Planning/ Forming One's own Opinion

Undertaking a long trip will inevitably involve lots of comments and concerns about what will be encountered and precautions that need to be put into place. Good trip preparation and planning will alleviate many of these concerns.

Concerns are often generated from fear of the unknown or tall tales. It is these concerns that need to be carefully evaluated in the preparation.



Time and time again we found that the only way to determine the true situation is to see for ourselves. For example we were advised that we would have to swim through parts of Tunnel Creek. Our experience was that the water barely reached our knees.

Topics of Discussion

Many an hour was spent contemplating the secrets of our world.

Such diverse topics as:

- Why is it that there appear to be fewer stars on horizon than directly over head?
- How does a Willy Willy work?
- Which way will a large tree branch float down a river?
- Is the world really a large balloon that is slowly shrinking as air leaks out creating the continually changing surface on which we survive?
- How soon will the male Bower Bird be successful in finding a mate after building such a beautiful bower to attract her?

It is a little known fact that they breed racing butterflies around some of the northern outback tracks. There were several occasions when these speeding creatures were seen beating 4*4's.

Australians will gather any where to back their country competing in any international sporting competition. So it was no surprise to see the camp site, on a remote outback station, deserted as everyone gathered around a television, located in the bar, to watch Australia defeat England in the Rugby.

Fellow Travellers

Perhaps Janet and Derek need special mention as they were only able to spend around 2 weeks as part of the trip. The addition of fresh faces always gives a new dimension and an increase in the overall pleasure of the experience. This experience was complimented by West Australians, Monique and Hermann, who accompanied us in the Mitchell Plateau adventure.

Summary

We are so very fortunate to live in a country that is so vast, so diverse and so awesome. A land of contrast, colour and beauty, all of which must be experienced at first hand to be fully appreciated.

This experience and celebration of The Kimberley must be done slowly and over regular cups of tea or coffee.

However, the B100 will only be available during the warmer months due to its tendency to gel inside the fuel filter in extra-cold conditions.

Bio-diesel has numerous benefits over traditional 'dino-diesel' in that it has better lubrication qualities, burns more efficiently and smells better to boot. If you've been wondering what all the fuss is about, now it's time to find out.

- ✓ Spares for a weekend trip: fanbelt, tools, jack and jacking plate, wheel brace, radiator hoses, other spares deemed essential for diesel and petrol engine 4WD's on a weekend trip

- ✓ First aid kit
- ✓ Warm clothing and an extra change of trousers, socks and warm sturdy footwear
Gloves, coat and hat
- ✓ Toiletries and medicines
- ✓ Thermos and lunches

Experience level:

All attendees should have done our 4WD Proficiency course.

Costs are: Each trainee - \$330.00 (Inc GST) each including two nights accommodation. If you are bringing your partner an extra \$100.00 (Inc GST) to cover the cost of the extra bed.


