

“Kit Tricks”

Bruce gives us a detailed account of how to overhaul your ageing winch so it doesn't fail you when you need it most.

This is how a mate (known as stunt hands) and I serviced a Warn XD9000 winch which was a few years old and its first time apart.

Remove winch from bar and lay winch on bench

The Teardown

Take the gearbox end off first. Gearbox looked tidy from the outside. Just the free spool lever was a touch stuck.



Then pulling it apart shows lots of a baby poo looking substance - and there is still water in there.



There was quite a bit of surface rust and water and the mushy yucky poo stuff!




Assembly

Elbow grease, toothbrush, wire brush, brake cleaner, and some funky ultrasonic blasting machine at Vince's work and in no time the items came out like new.



Nice and cleaned up properly... no 1/2 measures.



Fully Expoxied



"Stunt Hands" working to assemble the motor which went well but can be a challenge fitting the brush section on top back together again with the bearing/brushes not playing nicely.

Line up the motor parts and make sure everyone is happy using new bearings and gaskets.



Looks a touch better and should not corrode this time



The Gearbox

Stunt Hands mixing up the concoction

Moreys + Grease = Moreys Mix known as Icky poo. Guess work on ratio of both.



Sitting the bits in place to make sure everything is happy before coating them with the mix... be generous with the mix as you'll have plenty of it to go around



Covering it as much as possible and running it into the gears and down the sides and lots! Keep spinning the gears to get it right through.



At this point we sat the rod in place and used a cordless to test the gears were seated properly and to run some of the mix around through the gearbox. All went well. You had doubts?

Sorry no photo of this part as hands were way too coated but they will never rust...

Reassembly of the brake section with cleaned up drum and pads. If your winch is heavily used, replace pads



All together ready to bolt the braces on.



Moreys Heavy Duty Oil Stabilizer around \$20 - but I only used about 150ml
Grease \$10 - Didn't go through much as I thought I would
2 new Warn gaskets \$5
2 new Warn plastic drum bushes \$15
Tin of epoxy paint \$20
Brake Cleaner I already had several tins of it at home
Bearings \$10 for 2 from local bearing place - SKF bearings.

Use of Stunt Hands' machinery, emery paper, lathes, benches, rubber hammers, rags, brake cleaner as Solvol did nothing to clean our hands from that Moreys mix... Even the brake cleaner struggled so should do well inside the winch!

Grease is up to you on what brand and type you use - We used a Molylube style grease

If this is beyond you, you can pay pro's for similar service - I highly recommend Mal Leslie at SG Leslie and Sons in Heidelberg West - and will cost you around \$700 for waterproofing and service (2015 price when I last got quote)

D, or D-Man or the old chestnut (which thankfully not heard for a while) Dennis the Menace from the old comics. (see pic above)

What’s your vehicle?

Jeep Wrangler JL Rubicon Recon 2-dr which i use for serious off-roading and a Land Rover Discovery for caravanning, long road trips and easy national park tracks.

First car you ever owned?

Jeep Wrangler TJ Sport (I swear I have had other vehicles besides the Wranglers)

Dumbest thing you ever did in a car?

Oooh.....I think the statute of limitations and jurisdictions has passed; I can tell the real story. It was also my first significant accident (fortunately the only thing injured apart from the Jeep was my ego). I got my first Jeep when I lived in Dubai and we used to go “Dune Bashing”, basically off-roading in the desert. One particularly clear night, the moon was so bright that the desert tracks were clearly visible. So, the 5 vehicles in the convoy decided to switch off all the lights and drive by moonlight. We assumed there would be no one stupid enough to be doing the same thing coming in the opposite direction.

You can see where this story is going. As I came over a dune there was a Nissan Patrol coming in the opposite direction. Fortunately, I was able to turn hard right and we avoided a head-on collision. However, somehow my tyre ended up between the Patrol’s huge bulbar and bonnet. The momentum ripped his bulbar off and my wheel bent outward at the bottom and inward at the top.

Suffice to say after the dust settled (literally) both vehicles had some minor damage and i was basically on three wheels. I had to limp to the

main road and get a “friendly” mechanic to fix it without getting the “officials” involved. It was a costly lesson in more ways than one and i can attest to never doing something like that ever again.

If you are familiar with the Land Rover Camel Trophy series which was a series run all around the world. My ideal vehicle would be a Land Rover Defender 110 300TDI, done up with the standard kit for Camel Trophy.



Best trip/track/park you have done?

A long weekend trip into “The Rub Al Khali” (The Empty Quarter) desert between UAE, Saudi Arabia and Oman. With ancient forts and sand dunes from 100-300m high. It was a trip back in time and while it seems easy just driving on sand, the dunes are constantly shifting and the track (if you can call it that) needed constant focus.

Top tip to any beginners?

Join an off-road club and get to know your vehicle. Also if you want to seem a better driver than you are, get front and rear lockers. Thats my secret!!

Favourite camp food?

Cannot go past bacon, eggs, sausages on an open fire early in the morning.

Roughest night’s sleep on a trip?

I have been quite fortunate as I always overpack so have never really had a bad camping or overnight stay.

What snacks are we most likely to find in your cab?

Pringles (original), mixed nuts and at least one Mars bar (purely for energy of course!!)

Best piece of camping gear you are never without?

As a good Boy Scout, I always have my Swiss army knife which i now mostly only use to open bottles of wine which still have corks.

Worst upgrade or kit purchase?

On the Wrangler TJ, I got an air intake and exhaust kit that was supposed to increase the horsepower. It was clearly a lot of money for next to no increase. It was one of those purchases that cost too much because I did not know any better.

Dream track or trip at the top of your bucket list?

In Australia, Fraser Island and Cape Yorke. In the USA, the Rubicon trail.

Where in the world would you most like to visit?

On the bucket list is whiskey tasting trip across Scotland.

What is your go to karaoke song?

If I were to imbibe a considerable amount of distilled spirits, you might get me singing "I'm gonna be (500 miles)" by the Proclaimers.

Footie, football or rugby?

I grew up watching and supporting football (the round ball type) which I still do, staying up late on the weekends to watch the English Premier League. But footie is now way up there, **Go Tiges!**

What kept you sane during lockdowns?

Walking around the neighbourhood and discovering parks and places I did not know existed. Also I have improved my cooking skills.

Tasty Treats

Stuart and Maree, as seasoned travellers, kindly shared some of their cooking tips whilst out on the road. Here's the first instalment with more to follow next month.

Stuart's Yummy Damper

We use a cast iron camp oven. We have a trivet in the bottom and a 20 cm round cake tin that we cook the damper in. We pre heat the camp oven with coals on both the top and the bottom for about 10 minutes

We mix 1 kg of self-raising flour with 1-1/2 cans of beer, until it resembles a sticky dough. This is the point when you can make it plain or get adventurous by adding what ever you like. Stuart's favourite is cheese. He chops camembert and pokes it in or uses pre-packaged grated cheeses, sometimes he adds a tin of pineapple and a bit of sugar, but the sky is the limit. You need to grease the cake tin, then put the damper in, put it in the pre heated camp oven and refresh the coals.



It should take between 40 minutes and 1 hour to cook, checking as you go and rotating the camp oven to make sure you get an even heat.

Plain damper is traditionally served with golden syrup and butter, the others you can work out what works best.

Damper is not an exact science - it's a try and see and then try something else, but on a cold night with a roaring fire there is nothing better than sharing your cooking experience with your fellow travellers.

Dave's Birthday Roadtrip and Foodfest (20-21 November)

I managed to sneak away last weekend for my birthday, to a 100 acre private property just south of Traralgon. We had some family and friends join for an overnight camping trip.

We left home on the Saturday at approx. 8:30am, which is a really reasonable start for once (normally I try to leave at 6am to beat the traffic). We arrived at the private property at 11am, and proceeded to setup the trailer on the flattest ground I could find, then move the car closer to the camp fire, so I had access to the fridge and also 12v lighting for the evening.

Once that was done, I started a lunch time cooking fire, and had to season a brand new BBQ plate that I had prepared the previous weekend. I had ordered a sheet of flat 6mm plate steel (900mm x 450mm) and I cut 15mm almost through on 3 sides so I could fold the sides up and then welded them into place. With only a little bit of distortion taking place, I managed to clamp the plate in a way that took the distortion back out for an almost perfectly flat BBQ plate that many people could use at the same time. I got some warmth into the plate and oiled it up, then decided to use it right away to cook some chicken skewers for our lunch.



After lunch was over, I removed the plate and cranked up a much larger fire so that I would have a lot of nice coals for the pot roast dinner I was planning for all the family and friends.

I ended up borrowing a couple of extra camp ovens - I needed 4 in total. I got a nice large pork roast in the first pot, and then about 45 minutes later I put two smaller beef roasts in the 4.5 litre ovens, and I had the night before prepared a whole lot of potatoes, carrots and onions, which I placed into the remaining large oven. I kept the fire going nice and hot, and kept rotating the pots about every 10 minutes to allow for even cooking and at about 7pm i decided that the food was ready to serve. There was very little waste of remaining food, and it was very well cooked right through.



I managed to borrow a couple of beers from a friend, and started a dough mix for a damper which went into one of the large pots after the dinner was over. It took nearly an hour for the damper to cook properly as I probably had it a little too far away from the heat - but it turned out very nice, no burnt bits. With a choice of 2 jams, and cream - the damper disappeared really quick.

Breakfast the next morning was not exactly early, and then we started to pack up and leave by late morning.

Overall the weekend away was a chance to sit around the camp fire and just relax, to enjoy good company and good food. There are no really good four wheel drive tracks nearby the property, but there are no neighbours either (house's or campers) and there is lots of wood laying around without needing to scavenge any large distance.

Looking forward to seeing you all at the meetings, and out on the tracks in the coming year. I trust and hope 2022 will bring us together more and we can 'get out there' and enjoy our true backyard.


