

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

Are we going?

With only four days to go before kick-off, it took a little bit of prodding for Dennis to finally come up with the plan for the Trip. I shouldn't complain though, to be fair, he only had 3 months to prepare after it was discussed back in January.

The plan was to meet up at the Officer BP servo nice and early at 6:30 am on Saturday and head off to Dargo. The original crew had dwindled down to 5 cars/ 6 people after some pull-outs due to sickness & car problems.


A Blue Rag to the Red Rubicon

Shrine of Remembrance - Sun 18th June by Maree

We would like to thank Bruce Dunlop for ordering such wonderful weather for the day. The history of the Victorian Shrine was explained by Bruce.

We all walked through and it's a reminder of the cost of war. Its one of those places where everyone takes away a different perspective. Bruce explained with respect the different aspects of the building. We visited the Crypt and viewed the father and son statue, and the Guidon from the different regiments. We enjoyed the views from the Balcony over the city.



There was a service being held in the Sanctuary and we were able hear the last post sound out from the trumpet. Its one of those moments the hairs on the back of your neck stand up and take notice. Standing before the sign "Greater Love Hath No Man", we bowed our heads in reflection on the human cost of wars. Looking up at the carving towards the ceiling Bruce explained how the shaft of light is let in for the Remembrance Day at 11 am.

We all wandered through the Galleries of Remembrance and read the stories of the different wars. You follow the red arrows, and it leads you around the history. At this moment the Davanha Lifeboat was on display, and this included visual pictures of the historical use of this boat.

They change the displays from time to time. One of the displays that captured my attention was the entertainment that toured during the Vietnam war. Visual displays of the troops enjoying the performances provided.

We only just scratched the surface of what this public building has to offer. Nicki and I agreed to come back again another day for more reading.

The Shrine of Remembrance was built to provide a place to grieve and remember Victorians killed in the First World War (1914-18). It now provides a place of remembrance for Australian service and sacrifice in all wars since Australia's Federation in 1901.


Of the 114,000 Victorians who enlisted in the First World War, 89,000 served abroad and 19,000 died. Many were buried in graves far from home.

The Shrine provided a place where families could remember loved ones. It also represented the courage of the men, women and children who remained at home and laboured in support of national defence in wartime.

The design for the Shrine was selected by competition among Australian artists and architects. 83 designs were submitted, and the winning design was by 2 Melbourne returned-soldier architects, Philip Hudson and James Wardrop.

The inspiration for the external outline came from one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World — the mausoleum at Halicarnassus to King Mausolus of Caria, in Southwest Asia Minor.

While Australia faced frightful unemployment and financial difficulty in the late 1920s and 1930s, so great was the gratitude of the people that the huge amount required to build the Shrine was raised within six months from the opening of the appeal in 1928.



Prince Henry, the Duke of Gloucester and son of King George V, officially opened the Shrine before a crowd of 300,000 people in November 1934. Since then, other memorials have been added to the site to mark the service of successive generations, such as the Second World War Memorial Forecourt and the post– 1945 Memorial.

While direct experience and knowledge of the events of the First World War and later conflicts fade, interest in them is growing. Today the Shrine places a high priority on education and interpretation. Through commemoration, exhibitions and public programs, the Shrine continues to honour Victorian service and sacrifice and uphold and reinforce the values we associate with the original ANZACs.



On 28 February 1954, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II stood on a podium in front of a crowd of 250,000 people and pressed a button to light the Eternal Flame. It has burnt ever since. Today, the Flame provides a focus for ceremonies and is saluted during marches.



We were able to see this from the balcony and the forecourt looking down to the city buildings.

Last but not least we passed the memorial of Edward George Honey. This is what Wikipedia had to say about him. "Edward George Honey was an Australian journalist who suggested the idea of five minutes of silence in a letter to a London newspaper in May 1919, about 6 months before the first observance of the Two-minute silence in London." As Bruce pointed out he was not able to be part of the Shrine because it is for everyone and no individual is named on the Shrine site but across the road opposite there is a plaque in his honour.

It was a really interesting and moving day. A big thanks to Bruce for his time and for sharing his extensive knowledge.
