# **Track Classifications**

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:



This trip was all about showing some of the history and natural features of the forest area east of Gembrook. With the exception of Kurth Kiln, I don't believe these features are very well known and a day trip exploring the area is a great way to experience some of Melbourne's hidden secrets.

#### Gembrook

At the appointed time of 10:00 am we all met up at J.A.C Russell Park next to the Puffing Billy Railway Station. Before heading off at 10:30 we had a look around the Station and surrounds. The Station was rebuilt in 1998 when the original line from Belgrave was finally rebuilt. Unfortunately, it was too early to see Puffing Billy. We then headed off for our next stop at Kurth Kiln.





Kurth Kiln.

Arriving at Kurth Kiln after a short drive of 7.5 km we had a walk around the remains of the Kiln and surrounding buildings.

The Kiln was named after its inventor Professor E. Kurth and was built during World War 2 to produce charcoal which in turn was used to produce gas, an alternative fuel source to power automobiles during the war because of the shortage of petrol and is the only one of its type in Australia.






## Shiprock Falls.

A short drive around the Scout Loop Track to scope out the camping areas before heading off to Shiprock Falls which get their name from the large Monolithic rock near to the falls and is only 4.5 km from Kurth Kiln. A short walk past the Shiprock takes you to the Falls viewing platform. The base of the falls has lots of large boulders which have become dislodged and rolled down over millennia to their current resting place. With the recent rains, the falls were flowing quite hard. The Shiprock presented itself as an ideal backdrop for a group photo.









#### Beenak Cemetery.



The Cemetery lies on Beenak Road about 3km east of Launching Place Road and is situated in what should have been the Town of Beenak. According to a report from October 1899, the site was surveyed for a town but it was never built. It had a Post Office from 1878 until 1951 with the community mailbox attached to a tree.

A series of panels on the wall of the shelter explains the history of the area along with the original survey maps and selections. Included are eyewitness accounts of the 1939 Bushfires which came close to wiping out local properties along with a newspaper story of the triple murder and suicide in the town in 1951. The cemetery is still used today.


#### Seven Acre Rock.



The walk to the Rock from the carpark is an easy 1.5km return after which it was time for lunch at the small picnic area next to the car park.






## Four Brothers Rocks.

We left Seven Acre rock backtracking to Basan Corner then continuing along East Beenak Road to Ash landing Road, Black Snake Creek Road, Link Road then Burgess Road driving as far as the car park, followed by another walk of 1.2km return. This Rock formation is very interesting to walk around and marvel at how much time nature has to sculpt the rocks into their present-day shapes.

## Camper Setup - Member - Andre van der Walt

The story begins nearly 11 years ago, in February of 2013... I've been 4wding for a little while and with the arrival of my first born, suddenly the Prado n longer had enough room to take family camping with everything Anna (my wife) wanted. So after seeing this box trailer in a friends yard for a while, I had and idea...



The plan was simple. Some new bigger leaf springs, big wheels and take it camping. I only knew one person with a welder, so I roped Woody into helping me out. And this is where things took a turn.



When we got it upside down to sort the springs and axles, it became apparent that the trailer would not be robust enough to hold up to the rigors of off-roading. So a plan was concocted. What if we build a chassis and then put the box on it? So that is what we did.



The A-frame arms and hitch made its way to the newly built chassis. This chassis was built in Woody's driveway over a few weeks. One of his neighbors helped out with folding some sheet metal and making up the wheel arches in return for the holden axle and wheels the trailer came with. The new axle is electrically braked and the hubs matched the Prado stud pattern, rated to 1,250kg.

We bolted the box back on the chassis and gave it a paint job.



Yes the drawbar looks long in the photo, but it was designed to allow the Prado to get 90 degrees without touching, which we have needed once or twice following a certain couple in the club who are know for doing U-turns. A phone call to VicRoads confirmed all that was needed for registration, was a weighbridge ticket, a VIN plate and I need to bring it in to VIC roads.

This was the way we used the trailer for a long time. It was big enough to fit all our stuff, but the internal space was not efficient and it was always a pain to load and unload. But it allowed us to go out and enjoy camping.



It was the same height as the old Prado and the old V6 did not tow it to well if you were in a hurry. But the Prado di tow the trailer to many good locations.

Then COVID hit and I needed something to keep me occupied, Additionally, after many trips with the club and seeing how easy other people setup and pull down camp with limited effort, I decided it was time to have another go.

So of the metal recycler I went, armed with a 10mm spanner and a socket wrench. A few minutes later the box was unbolted and lifted of the chassis.



The goal was to build a trailer that was 600mm high, instead of the 900mm of the original. It need to have a opening lid and swing open tailgate to have the kitchen.

At this point I have acquired a gasless MIG welder and drop-saw and a basic set of tools. Making many accurate measurements and some close cuts and many, many tack welds and test fits, I managed to build the frame for the trailer.



The frame is 30mm square tube with a 2.5mm wall thickness. The floor is 1.5mm sheet steel. Unfortunately, I can't weld aluminum but I wanted to keep the weight down, so I needed a solution. Rivets and automotive Sikaflex was used to bond the aluminum panels to the frame and also 300 stainless steel pop rivets for the floor, lid, side panels and tailgate.



Inside the trailer is fitted with a set of Kings drawers to help with organization and a Dune roof top tent is mounted to the lid.



This setup makes it very easy for me and Anna to setup camp and be ready to relax or go quickly and with minimum effort. We pull in to camp, unload our bags, chairs and kids tents.


Close the lid, take the cover of the Dune tent, pull the strap and let the tent set it self up. To prepare dinned, swing open the tailgate and the kitchen in almost ready to go! The gas stove goes on top from where it can easily reach the mounted gas bottle.



As for our kids, I wanted a setup that gets them of the ground and gives them their own space, so they each have their own stretcher tent, these take a couple of minutes each to set up,



The new setup is pretty good for our need, with only one more upgrade planned for the trailer. Since finishing the new version of the trailer, it has completed a couple of really epic trips, including a Simpsons desert crossing and a section of the Little desert in VIC.
