### Track Classifications

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:



#### A Day Adventure to Walhalla

The day trip started on a bright, sunny morning—perfect for exploring the picturesque tracks around Walhalla. Everyone was punctual, gathering at BP Officer at 9:30 AM with coffee-to-go in hand. Spirits were high as we prepared for a day of adventure.

#### The Journey Begins

With a quick radio check complete, we hit the Princes Highway, cruising towards Moe. About 40 minutes later, we exited the highway at the Moe turnoff and stopped for a group briefing. Andy shared the plan, the vehicle sequence, and safety tips. Steve in his Everest took up the role of tail-end Charlie, while the two Hiluxes followed ahead of him. My Hilux was the odd one out, being the only vehicle without a winch!

After a quick fuel stop at the Moe servo, we headed out of town onto Moe-Rawson Road. The narrow, winding road reminded us we were entering hilly terrain. Twenty minutes later, we turned onto Moondarra-Reservoir Road, a dirt track that took us to our first destination: the Moondarra Reservoir Lookout.

Here, we paused to take in the views and snap some photos. Suzy got us all some delicious cupcakes, adding a sweet start to the trip. A bit of trivia: the name Moondarra originates from the Aboriginal word mundara, meaning "plenty of rain or thunder."


#### Tackling the Tracks

With this first stop complete, we were back on dirt roads, beginning with W18 Track, followed by Tyres-Walhalla Road and Cowwarr-Walhalla Road, where we aired down. The increasing heat of the day had raised my tire pressures to 40 PSI, making the ride a bit stiff. A quick air-down to 18 PSI in the rear and 20 PSI in the front worked wonders, smoothing out the drive.

Our journey eventually brought us to Bruntons Bridge Road and the highlight of the day: the Thomson River crossing. Excitement rippled through the group as we parked to assess the crossing. The river didn't look too deep, but the descent into it was steep and tricky, with the potential for rear-end damage due to lower departure angles on the banks. The exit, too, had a deeper section requiring careful navigation.

### The River Crossing

Once everyone felt confident, Andy and Suzy in their Mitsubishi Challenger led the way. Andy skilfully navigated the descent into the river and powered through the deeper section to reach the far bank with ease.

Next was Matteo in his Hilux. His challenge was managing the steep descent, but his rear

bar provided protection as he bumped it slightly while entering the river. From there, Matteo made the crossing look effortless.

Then it was my turn. Watching Matteo bump his rear bar added a layer of anxiety—my Hilux lacked that extra protection. I decided to take a slightly different line, moving further to the right, and requested Steve to spot me for added reassurance. With careful feathering of the accelerator and constant feedback from Steve over the radio, I made it into the river smoothly. Following the planned line, I crossed the deeper section confidently and felt a huge sense of relief and accomplishment as I reached the other side. This was only my second river crossing, and it was exhilarating!

Finally, Steve brought his Everest across with no issues, completing the crossing for our group. With everyone safely on the far side, we paused for a much-deserved lunch break, sharing stories and laughs by the riverbank.



Andy was all set up and had picked out the best spot right at the end of the camping area where we had plenty of room to spread out.


After setting up, it was time to crack the first cold one and relax by the fire. After the long drive we all went to bed early, ready for the next day's adventures.

At the top we turned right onto Clear Hills track for the short run to Craigs Hut. There were only a couple of other cars there which was unexpected seeing as it was a long weekend.



Cairn Creek Track starts just near Lovicks Hut and its interesting that the Hema Map book rates the track as easy. The first part of the track is steep and rocky, definitely not an easy rating now, but once past this section, it became much easier.

also clear that the track has very little use.

Joining back up to Brocks Road was where we saw Snake #3. A 1-metre-long Tiger snake was sunning itself in the middle of the road but quickly disappeared over the edge once disturbed. I jumped out to have a look, but he unfortunately was nowhere to be seen.

Refrigerator Gap track was another lightly used track, which completed the circuit back up to Bluff link road, then 16-mile Jeep track again, although downhill this time. Sean had concerns over his tyres having enough grip as their best days were well behind them. The tracks were very dry and shaley, but he made it without any dramas.

#### Tuesday Nov 5th

To avoid the potential heavy traffic back to Melbourne, everyone packed up as much as possible the night before and we all got away by 8:30am.

Airing up at the start of the bitumen at Mirimbah, next stop was Mansfield to refuel.

We said our goodbyes here and everyone made their own way home.

That ended a fantastic weekend with great company and plenty of laughs, lots of interesting tracks of varying difficulty and exploring some new areas. The trek up to Mt Eadley Stoney being a real standout.
