## **Track Classification**

Four Wheel Drive Victoria have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

#### Friday 7th March

We met at BP Calder Park and everyone was running ahead of time which made for a smooth departure. We spotted a group of Jeeps in the car park so before we left I checked out where they were heading and it was Murray Sunset so we would not be bumping into them which is great.

First stop was Wycheproof Bakery for a snack to help us on our trip through to Blue Gums camp site. As we headed into town I had always seen the sign to go to Mt Wycheproof and in the bakery I spotted that it was Australia's smallest mountain so I figured we should go and climb it. So once everyone was stocked up with bakery goodies we headed to Mt Wycheproof and scaled its heady heights. It stands 42M above the surrounding area. There was a sculpture made out of the railroad nails which would have taken a while to construct and looked great.







Next stop was the famous Sharps Bakery in Birchip. They have some of the best Vanilla Slices in the state and have won the best Vanilla Slice competition numerous times. They missed out this year but it was still worth a stop. Some of the group had not been to Birchip before and got to meet the Mallee Bull in the centre of town. Another 40mins down the road we checked out the Silo Art at Sealake. I have been to this silo at least 6 times and I just noticed the wonderful echidna at the bottom of the Silo. Always something new to see.





The next stop was Lake Tyrrell. They have invested well in the infrastructure here to go out and enjoy the salt lake. They views are incredible and so expansive.





After all the sightseeing it was time to fuel up for the last confirmed fuel stop in Ouyen. We headed to what we thought was the cheapest fuel in the town and others went to different stations in the area.

The fuel station was unmanned so you swipe your card, they put a hold on your cash and you fill up. They then only charge you for what you use. So we started pouring the fuel and it was the slowest pump ever. I swear we would get about 400mls every minute or so. We kept persevering and then it was just crazy slow so we decided that we would try the other pump. We moved the vehicle around to the other side. Fun when we have a trailer on.


We then started again and the fuel was pouring slightly faster than the first time which lured us into a false sense of security... and then...it...slowed...down. Now everyone else was field up and waiting for us. They waited and waited and waited... it took about 45mins for us to fill our 140 litre tank. The price you pay for 20 cent per litre savings!!

We then got on the road for the trip into camp. I had seen that there might be a new fuel stop in Murrayville which is not far from camp and would be great if it is there as it means there is not far to go to top up with fuel once we are in the park. We stopped in Walpeup to have a look at the Silo Art there before heading through to Murrayville.

It was on this part of the trip that I realised that my Hema HX2 was not working properly so I was trying to get it to work but the intermittent mobile coverage was not my friend and it was going to be a weekend of paper maps.

We got to the air down point which is about 2 km from camp. There is a nice small dune to get up that can be quite soft and a bit of a challenge without the right tyre pressures. This is where the practice begins. We took a couple of goes to get up the dune... It helps if you put it in four wheel drive! The sand was hot, puffy and like talcum powder. We coached everyone up the hill with some taking more goes than others. This was the first time using four wheel drive for Vernon and the grin he had was huge. Scott and Mandie whilst have done a lot of four wheel driving, this time they had their camper trailer on. Once Scott dialed in the momentum they were up and at em.

We rolled into camp and got set up. It was hot, which was the theme for the weekend. We had met a couple in Talbotville and they live near Adelaide and we got a message they were going to join us for the weekend so we headed out to meet them as we thought they were going to have a camper trailer and as it was on dark it would be better to meet them and guide them in. They decided not to bring the camper trailer but we met them anyway.



#### **Saturday 8th March**

Today was all about getting to know driving in the sand and exploring a few parts of the park. Our first stop was Thompson's Lookout. This is a tricky climb as it has lots of corners. We got to the top and then positioned ourselves so we could see everyone coming up.

The tyre pressures were all dropping and everyone was learning how to drive sand and corners. Tristan got in to support a couple of people to get up the hill. Daisy took off and when she went to go around the corner and we heard a pop phhfff. Her tyre had come off her rim, She backed down slowly and everyone jumped in to help get it all sorted out.





This area kept us well occupied for the morning and then once we all made it to the top of the dune, the views were spectacular. The temperature was rising and was well into the 30's as we travelled along the sand dunes high above the desert. We found another dune to climb.

This was a lot easier as it was straight up but at the top you can either come down the same way.



We then proceed to head to a dune that also gets called Big Dune but isn't. It is close to Murrayville-Nhill Road. This is a dune that we had not done before so we were excited to give it a go.

I did not have enough momentum and got very stuck up the top as I was trying to cross over the top to come down a track. So Tristan had to get out and push the car so I could get it off the berm of sand I was wedged on.

It was another lot of fun. Our plan was to then head down to Big Billy Bore but

Neville was having issues with his car and potentially the turbo. So we decided to head back to camp and take it easy on more formed roads. When we got to the last dune before camp we strapped the Triton onto the back of the Patrol and we pulled Neville up the Dune with puffs of sand and the roar of the V8.



Once we got back to camp it was worked out that the turbo hose had come off. A relatively easy fix and not a major which was great.

It was another stinking hot day so no fire tonight and plenty of cold drinks while we debriefed the day's four wheel driving.

With the heat and the sand so soft we had more tyre issues so far than any other trip.

#### **Sunday 9th March**

We knew that Big Dune was going to be a big day so we left a bit earlier to try as it is a couple of hours to get to Big Dune from where we camp. We headed down a track and a four wheel drive came so fast at us on a corner that he went up off the track and he did not stop. He stopped to talk to the car behind us and he was so embarrassed for going too fast. We found where he got stuck and could not go any further, we just drove up and over the dune.

Vernon called and he said he could hear a noise. So we pulled up and then he called and said back up and running. We just cruised along the track and we pulled out to a hard stand area on Murrayville-Nhill Road to regroup. It was then that I got told Vernon's tyre was damaged.

Well it was not just a little damaged. It was destroyed. We learned what the noise was. The tyres had deflated so much and he had driven quite some time with it fully flat. We limped him onto harder sand and the pit crew got to work and before he knew it the spare was changed and we were on our way.

Once we got Vernon's spare tyre on we headed through to Big Dune ready for the challenge of the weekend. We pulled into the parking area at the base of Big Dune and we took off to test it out in the Patrol. Tristan made it up with just the right amount of pace and momentum. The sand was very soft. He had a couple of goes and then it was my turn.



I took off and headed up the dune, but I backed off too early and did not make it to the top. Another try and I got up the top. We then set up to direct everyone up the dune.

It was super hot so everyone was finding shade where they could watch everyone have a go. There was lots of encouragement, ribbing and support. Some made it on their first go and some had to try again to get up or reduce tyre pressures lower so they had more tyres on top of the sand. Stu was so very close to getting his heavy touring 79 Series up to the top but missed it by mere meters.





Once everyone had had a go a few people tried different runs up Big Dune as there are about 4 different tracks to the top. Tristan took Anthony for a blast in the patrol and I was watching from the bottom. As Tristan took the hardest track to the left he then turned towards the top and I heard a pop. Not a great sound when the V8 is roaring. I waited and the engine seemed ok so I radioed Tristan and told him I had heard the pop. He quickly checked the tyre pressure screen and saw 0 PSI on the front right tyre. He had popped the tyre off the bead. He backed slowly down the dune to a flatter spot and I then got Stu and a couple of others to drive up to help them. It did not take long to get the tyre back on the rim.

Once we finished playing at Big dune we went to explore some tracks we had not been on. We found a great wide open area which would be a fantastic campsite for another time. We weren't sure which way to go so Stu went and checked for us.

While he was doing that, there was a challenging dune that we went up and as we got to the top it closed in with a narrow opening at the top like a small skate bowl. We had no idea what we were going to find but had to commit to the soft sand. We popped out into the bowl and there was a track hidden out the back of it so we headed down the track which took us to the bottom where we started. It was great fun but it was already getting late and we had to head back so put it on the list for next time.

We carried on and we stopped in an open area to bring the group back together. 11 cars make for long convoys. I heard a four wheel drive so went to have a look and found a big sand bowl with 2 cars racing around it. Definitely put it on the list for next time.

The group came back together so we carried on. The plan was to head into Murrayville for some fuel and to get a drink. I missed the turn so we carried along firebreak track until we got to a point that looked like we could go right. I asked Stu if he could check it out. He took off and then called radio saying not ideal so we carried onto the left and he carried on. We stayed in touch on the radio and he found his way through to come out ahead of us.

We headed into Murrayville and a few of us fueled up as we were getting low while the others went to the pub to get a drink or to the cafe for an ice cream. It was still very hot so once our thirst was quenched we headed back to camp.





The weather has been building all day with rain in the distance. As we got closer to camp they rain fell harder. It made it easy to drive on the sand and as we pulled into camp I ran around closing tents as best as I could. Neville and Riley had a lot of water on their beds. Daisy has a little bit and we got some too. The danger of leaving tents open due to heat and fickle Victorian weather!

The good news was it managed to cool it down to a level where we could actually light a fire to enjoy for the last night of our trip.

#### **Monday 10th March**

Tristan and I had to leave by 830am as we were meeting a work contact in Birchip so we left with Scott and Mandie. Daisy ended up with a flat tyre as we were leaving so she had to get that sorted at camp. It is not often that I have to leave people to sort things out but we were on a timeline and there were still people in camp. Daisy and Neville then headed out together.

The group was splitting up for the trip home as we had to leave early. Adam took the opportunity on this trip to head off to Adelaide for a few days. Stuart was planning on heading through to Nhill to show Alan and Ann and Ian and Audrey some places through that way.

Vernon and Dimitri had a bit of packing up to do and they were leaving a bit later. I heard later on that they had an adventure with another flat tyre on their way home.

Scott blew a connection on his air hose pipe so we helped him fill the rest of his tyres. They had to stop in Walpeup and that is where we left them.

We had a great work meeting and got home not too late. Everyone made it home safe from a great weekend away
