

Track Classifications

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

Trip Report

Trip Report: Orphan's Christmas at Talbotville (first 4 days)

Note: This is Sushant's take on Orphan's Christmas at Talbotville for the first four days (22-25 Dec)

Day 1 (22—Dec): The adventure began for me on December 22nd. Tristan and Sally had already set up base camp at Talbotville the day before, but Lynton and I were starting our journey on Monday morning of Christmas week. Our usual plan was in place—meet up at the BP Officer, convoy up together, and stay in touch via UHF 12.

When I met Lynton, the excitement was palpable—this was going to be my first trip to Vic High Country!

With Lynton leading, we set off towards Stratford to fuel up before heading to Talbotville. Sally's tip to fuel up there instead of Dargo saved us quite a few dollars, given the significantly higher fuel prices in Dargo.

Our route from Officer to Stratford followed Google Maps, which took us through long, empty roads cutting across picturesque farmlands. At Stratford, we fueled up, but Lynton also made a pit stop at the local IGA to stock up on liquor to last the entire week!

With supplies sorted, we hit the road towards Talbotville, taking the scenic and winding Bairnsdale-Dargo Road, which led us to the iconic Dargo Pub. We stopped for a quick look around, and Lynton took the opportunity to top up his fuel tank and fill a couple of jerry cans.

From Dargo, we continued north for about 20 minutes before leaving the bitumen and turning onto McMillans Road. While generally considered a 2WD-accessible road, the conditions were far from ideal, so we aired down for a smoother ride. Before long, we had to switch to 4H/4L for better control. Though a 2WD vehicle could technically make it, certain sections would have been a real struggle.

Along the way, we spotted a black snake lying lifeless on the road—most likely a black tiger snake rather than a red-bellied black snake. Carefully maneuvering through the narrow patches, we finally arrived at the Talbotville camping area.

Tristan and Sally had secured the best camping spot—right beside the river, offering both privacy and easy water access. Lynton and I quickly set up our camps and, with the evening settling in, it was time for some good food.

This trip was my chance to put those skills to the test—I whipped up a spicy curry, and we enjoyed a fantastic meal by the fire. With a chill in the air, a warm campfire, and great company, the evening couldn't have been better.





Day 2 (23 Dec): This was the day for some serious 4WD action! After a morning coffee and breakfast, we were ready to roll. Tristan and Sally took the lead, with Lynton as our tail-end charlie. Our first challenge was Crooked River Tk, which starts right from the campground.

Just as we were getting warmed up, we encountered our first set of deep ruts. Tristan navigated them effortlessly. I followed, nearly making it through—until my rear right tyre slipped in. Thinking a simple reverse and extra throttle would do the trick, I attempted to power through, only to have my front tire drop into the rut as well! At that point, my rear right tyre was the only one still on the ground—what a way to kick off Crooked River Tk!

I tried every trick—rear locker, traction control on and off—but the Hilux wouldn't budge. It was time for a recovery. Sally took charge on the radio while Tristan prepared the snatch strap. After some digging to improve clearance, we attempted a light pull, but nothing. A second try—still no movement. By the third attempt, even Tristan's wheels were spinning. It was looking like a winch job.

On our final snatch attempt, Tristan engaged his rear locker, reversed, and gave it one last go. Success! I was out of the ruts, feeling relieved and grateful for the teamwork!

With adrenaline pumping, we pushed ahead through steep ascents and descents, navigating 25 river crossings along the way. Thanks to Sally's guidance and Tristan's expertise in picking the right lines, it was an incredible learning experience.

Our next challenge was Bulltown Spur Track—my first double black diamond track. With Crooked River Track already proving intense, I was a bit nervous, but I knew that picking the right lines would be key. The ascent was steep, but keeping the front wheels grounded and using steady throttle allowed Hilux's traction control to shine. Concentrating on the track rather than the intimidating drop-offs helped me reach the top—where we were greeted by stunning views of the iconic Billy Goat Bluff Track. Too bad I wouldn't be staying long enough to tackle it this time!

Back at camp, we cooled off with a swim in the river. Tristan made full use of a croco-dile floaty designed for 45kg max weight—somehow making it work for him! As the sun set, we gathered around the fire, shared stories, and enjoyed the starry sky.




A cozy end to a great day of 4wding




At Harrisons Cut


Sunday was heating up so we all packed and made our escape mid-morning stopping off at a cafe along the way and a side of the road cool down for an overheating pajero.
