President's Report



Hello and welcome to another month of *Free Wheeling*.

As you may be aware there was a recommendation from Four Wheel Drive Victoria (mainly the CEO) to increase the fees by \$10 for the 08/09 financial year, which equates to an increase of approximately 50%. After talking to several people, including another club's Vice President, there was certainly some angst about the proposal. John and I attended the recent 4WDVic general meeting where the issue was to be discussed and put forward to the members. These are some of the issues raised and information shared.

- Several clubs, including the VFWDC, raised the point of continued closures of tracks. We were informed of what is being done in certain regions such as Bunyip and Toolangi and the ongoing work to re-open these.
- This point raised the question regarding communication with clubs. While we see and hear about closures we don't always hear about the processes in place to re-open or keep them open. As a result, a section is being included in the new forum to discuss tracks and keep abreast of latest action.
- We were informed that a process is being put in place with Parks Vic which includes four criteria before they can close a track. Two of them are that 4WD Vic has to be consulted before a track is to be closed, after which a proposal must be prepared for the 4WD advisory committee to sign off on. This should ensure we don't see the closure of tracks without the knowledge of 4WD Vic.
- PV is unable to close a track that has been formed for more than two years without going through the above process.
- Track classification will ensure a double black diamond (hard) track will always remain such, and same goes with all other classifications.
- PV will possibly manage all forests in the future taking over those currently managed by DSE. Due to the strong relations 4WD Vic have with PV this could be a good outcome for all concerned.

As a result of all the discussions, a business plan will be put forward from the CEO of 4WDVic outlining how much of a fee increase is required and where it will be used. This will be presented later this year and any increase voted on will be for the 09/10 period.

Mentioned above is a new forum on the 4WD Vic website. This will be used to discuss several issues and is available to all club members. For further details log onto their web site where you will be able to join the forum and voice any concerns or highlight information about a particular issue.

AGM Dinner. We have booked the venue (see flyer for details) but have had to change the date. The venue is conveniently located in Dandenong and we are expecting a good turnout this year. Make sure you join us for a rare night out that isn't in the bush.

Last but not least, as you are all aware the elections are not far away and there are a couple of key positions up for nomination. Please consider joining the Committee as there are great benefits in setting the direction of the Club. If you would like any information about any of the Committee positions, please do not hesitate to call me. Remember the Club does not run by itself and it needs your help to continue to operate successfully.

Look forward to seeing you on the next trip – or at the next meeting.

CLUB KITCHEN

Chilli con carne with quesadillas



INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon olive oil
300g beef mince
1 medium red onion (170g), chopped finely
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon Tabasco sauce
2 teaspoons ground cumin
2 teaspoons ground coriander
1 teaspoon dried oregano
400g can crushed tomatoes
½ cup (130g) chunky tomato salsa
400g can kidney beans, rinsed, drained
400g can chickpeas, rinsed, drained

Quesadillas

¾ cup (90g) coarsely grated cheddar cheese
4 x 20cm flour tortillas
20g butter

METHOD

Heat half the oil in medium saucepan; cook beef, stirring, until browned, remove from pan. Heat remaining oil in same pan; cook onion and garlic, stirring, until onion softens.

Return beef to pan with sauces, cumin, coriander and oregano; cook, stirring, 2 minutes.

Add undrained tomatoes then stir in salsa, beans and chickpeas; cook, uncovered, 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, make quesadillas. Serve chilli with quesadillas.

We woke to a chilly morning with a slow rising mist in the lovely camping ground of Sheeppark Flats. The camping spots here are plentiful and very nicely grassed. Our first stop for the morning was to the very neat Fry's hut which was literally just around the corner of our camp. Clearly this hut wasn't affected by the recent bushfires and was in excellent condition.

From there we continued onto the Upper Jamieson hut which was nicely situated next to a lovely river with an abundance of tree ferns and shrubbery. Unfortunately the area was spoilt by the muddy surround from the traffic this hut must receive.



We then had a lovely drive up to one of my old favourites, Bluff Hut. This has just been recently rebuilt and was just reopened just a week before. Although it is still a great hut, it is somewhat different to the original hut and is quite a bit smaller.



Continuing along the track from the Bluff hut we found a great place to stop for lunch looking over the valley below and the surrounding mountain ranges. Saturday, 7 June

Ashley and I met up with the Ryans on the Monash at around 9.30am. The weather was a little gloomy, but as everyone says when heading in this direction "wait til you get over the Dividing Range". Well, I now know that this to be fact because as soon as he hit the ranges, the sky split in two – one side grey and miserable, one side blue and sunny. It was an easy drive up and we arrived at the camping ground at around midday. How nice to set up in daylight for a change! The camping area is very pleasant, plenty of trees and surrounded by remnants of old gold mines. We had a few neighbours but they were all very well behaved – we were probably the noisiest bunch on the block. After settling in and having some lunch, we walked up and into Balaclava Mine.



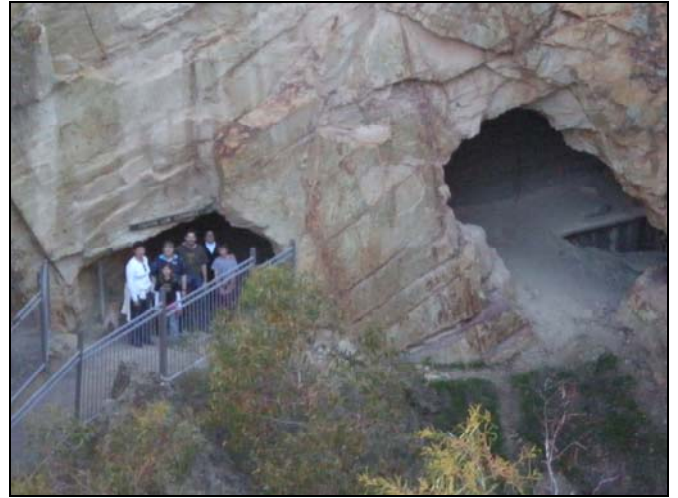
A little history on this mine:

John Thomas Lewis and James Nickinson, both seamen, discovered a large nugget of gold in the grass on the top of the highest hill at Whroo on 25 October 1854. This was the same date as the Battle of Balaklava in Russia during the Crimean War. Hence the Balaclava Mine derived its name from the English spelling.

In May 1855, the Balaclava Mine was opened. In July 1863 Lewis drove a tunnel from west to east through Balaclava Hill to allow a tramline to operate. Gold bearing quartz was carted out of the mine on the tramline to nearby steam driven stamping batteries where it was crushed to release the gold.

Archibald Menzies used wealth gained from his Balaclava Mine venture with John Lewis to build the

majestic Menzies Hotel that was situated on the corner of Bourke and William Streets in Melbourne. Lewis and Menzies crushed 85,804 tons of quartz and recovered 21,340 ounces of gold worth 85,000 pounds sterling from 1866 to 1881.



We walked through to the other side of the mine (you can just see the other entrance in the photo above) and strolled back to camp.

Steve, Nicole and Mia arrived just as we were walking into the camping area, which was fortunate because I think Steve was looking for Ashley's 4WD and didn't recognise the Commodore so was about to head off to look for us. Ashley and Paul went off to gather wood. As per the norm, we had happy hour and then dinner and a very pleasant, longish evening ensued.

Sunday, 08 June

After a relaxed start to the day, we headed out from camp at around 10:30am. Our first destination was to be the Tahbilk winery just out of Nagambie, but we quite accidentally happened upon 12 Acres winery along the way. The only problem was, the gates were still closed (I guess some vineyards like to wait until at least lunch time before opening the cellar door) so we pressed on with a view to stopping in on our return.

In short time, we made it to Tahbilk. It is quite a sizable vineyard. As we made our way to the main

cellar door, the long, meandering driveway which took us past numerous varieties of grape and gave us all an idea of what to expect. The property boasts its own wetlands and, for a small fee, visitors are able to view local birdlife and other sights of interest from the water. Everyone from our group however had one main thing on their minds – wine tasting! Within the main building, one can view the numerous awards, diplomas and medals that Tahbilk has earned over the years.



Some dated back to the early 1930's but there is a much deeper history to this family-owned and run winery which goes back as far as the 1860's. There was a large selection of wines, chutneys, flavoured cooking oils and other wares for sale and I am proud to say that our club did its little bit to stimulate the local economy, After an hour or so at Tahbilk, and with vehicles now half-full with wine and other local produce, it was time to see what else the region had to offer. We next made our way through to Plunkett Fowle's winery at the edge of the Strathbogie Ranges where a meticulously restored 1928 model Graham-Paige saloon car was parked in the main car park. Some headed into the winery to sample the wines on sale while others were happy to listen to the gent who owned the vintage car speak about the history of the marque and the finer points of restoration. After wine tasting at Plunkett Fowle's and a few purchases later, we all drove over to the township of Avenel. here, an arts and craft market was being held in what appeared to be some local's back yard. There were all manner of wares for sale, from needlework to fresh produce, live fowls and even large red gum slabs for the woodworking enthusiast.

We all spent a bit of time working our way through the stalls before realising that time was getting the better of us and that it was already a little past lunchtime.

We drove from Avenel to Nagambie township and stopped for a bite to eat along the shores of the lake. The sun was out, a gentle breeze blew and made for a most pleasant and mild winter's day. Nobody was in any particular rush after lunch so we spent a bit of time just basking lakeside in the sun.

From there we headed over to Murchison winery and got to sample not only their award winning table wines but also a selection of their own range of Vazzoler cheeses. The quality of produce was excellent and I am sure that the club members were just as happy with their individual purchases as the owners would have been with our visit. It turned out that our timing was impeccable as we learned over the course of a few glasses that the owners were closing the doors for a month in order to holiday and study cheese-making techniques in Europe. From Murchison, we began to make our way back towards camp and stopped briefly to cut and collect a bit of red gum (of which there was plenty) along the way. From there we headed back but detoured via the local Whroo cemetery and a nearby Aboriginal rock well.

The cemetery was steeped in history and the number of different countries from which the town's founding migrants had come was really quite amazing. There were several unmarked sites while others described the relatively young age at which several others had passed, and this gave us all a bit of an idea just how hard life must have been for some.

After spending time at the cemetery and rock well, we all settled in back at camp for a few drinks followed by dinner around the fire. Some were happy to stay up for a bit while others caught up on lost sleep from the previous night. All in all, it was a very relaxing and enjoyable day and the weather was quite pleasant considering the time of year.
